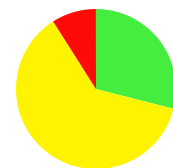

Due to a large number of retirements looming, Economic Development and Planning outlined this as a critical need for the county. During the year-long training, participants learned about government operations, budgeting, skill-building in conflict management, team-building, and more.

# 2018 Public Health Highlights:

- Due to a significant number of influenza cases, we responded with an educational campaign targeting prevention of the spread of the flu.
- With the assistance of an AmeriCorps volunteer, we had a record-setting year for Narcan trainings.
- Several outreach activities took place including rabies prevention billboards, the release of monthly "What the Health!?" restroom flyers, and multiple television interviews.
- Successful collaboration with community partners has led to great things. We partnered with schools to educate hundreds of students about preventing Lyme disease, practiced a Point of Dispensing event and organized a parent support group for families with special needs children.
- Environmental Health worked with local food operators to ensure safe food handling as reports of foodborne diseases occurred locally and nationally.
- Healthy Neighborhoods Program responded to reports of rodent infestations, requests for childproofing assistance and home pollution leading to illness.

- Accessibility for those with physical or language barriers.

# Ticks & Lyme Disease

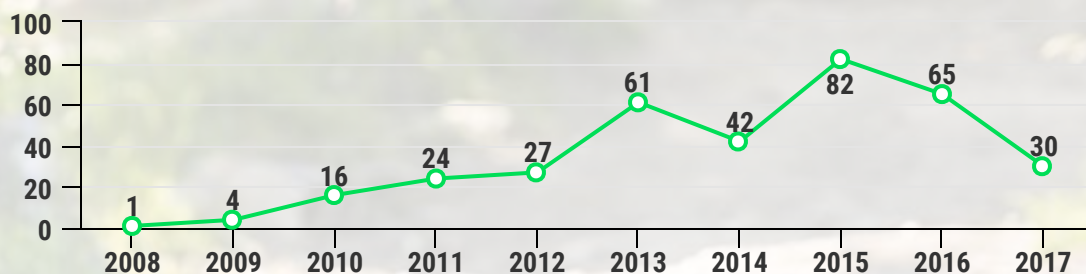
## Outreach and Education

### We are proud to report:

- Last spring we teamed up with the Carantouan Greenway, along with Southern Tier Lyme Support, A Hope for Lyme, PA Lyme Resource Network, and Binghamton University to bring "Youth Tick and Lyme Disease Educational Awareness Campaign" to Tioga and Waverly School Districts.
- Through these presentations, we were able to educate over 1,330 students about protecting themselves from ticks, the importance of tick checks, and the signs of Lyme disease.



## Confirmed Cases of Lyme Disease in Tioga County



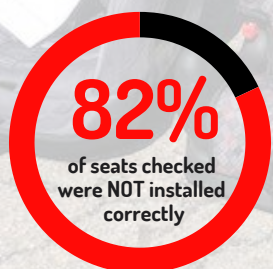
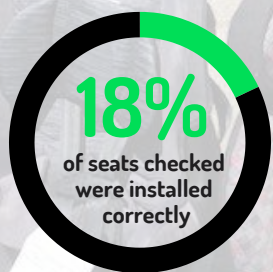

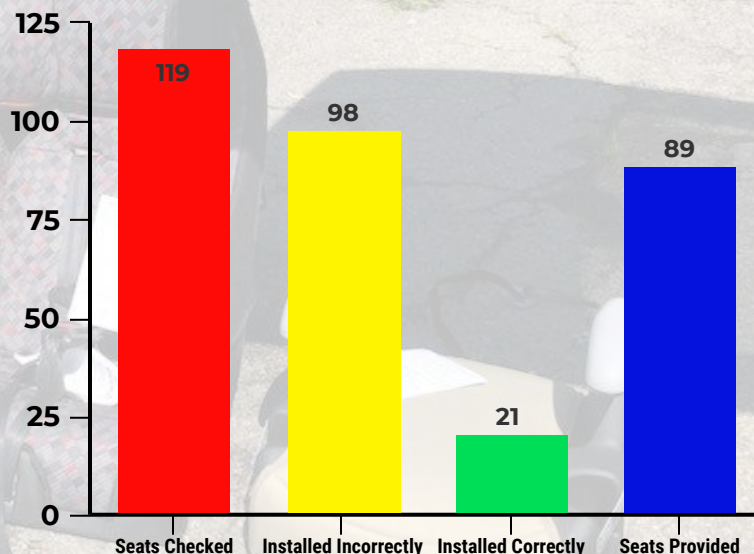
# Child Passenger Safety

## 2018 Tioga County Child Passenger Safety Statistics

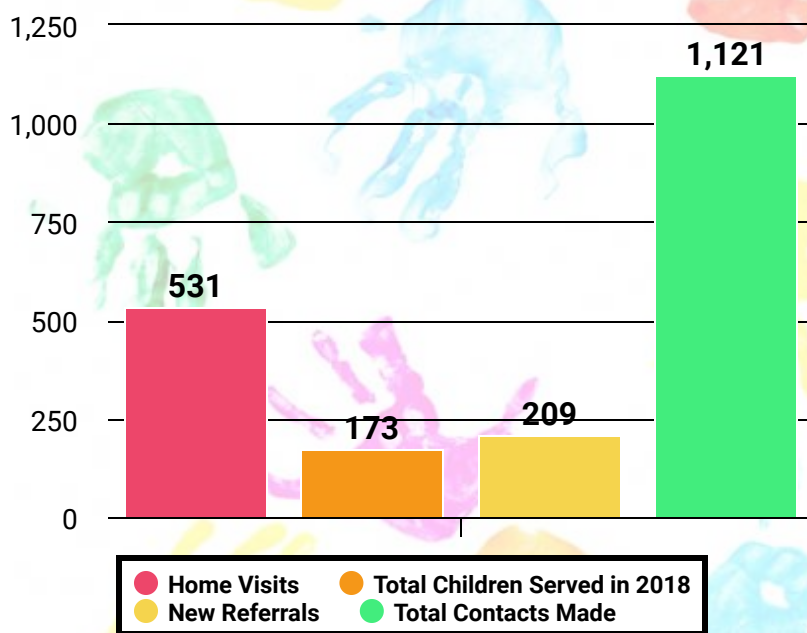

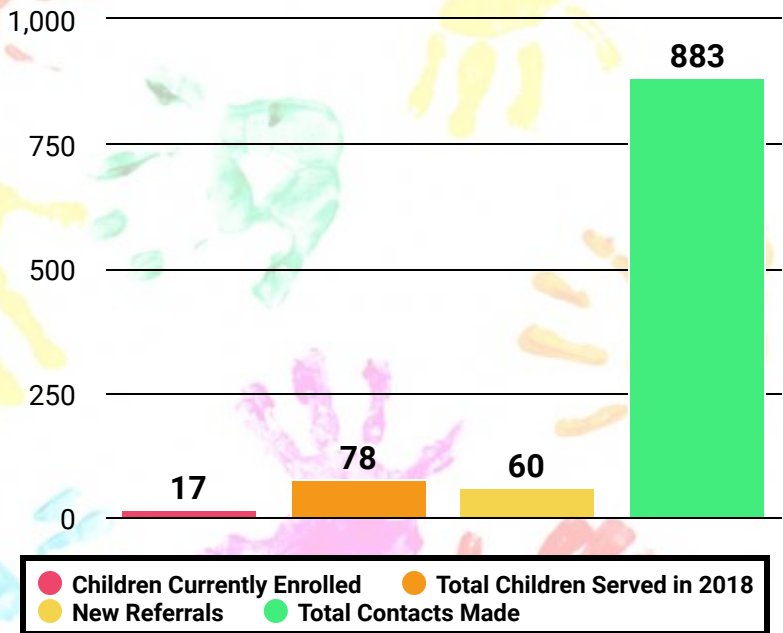

## Developmental Resource Library

### Great News!

Thanks to a \$5,000 award from the Pickert-Hickock Fund of the Community Foundation we have been able to implement a Developmental Resource Library for Children with Special Needs.

### Our goal is to:

- Provide specialized resources for free to families.
- Partner with the Coburn Free Library and Waverly Free Library.
- Provide a variety of resources, such as books, DVDs, some toys, computer software and other Assistive Technology Devices. Examples include books and videos on Autism, Down syndrome and learning disabilities, weighted blankets, compression vests, and tablets for non-verbal children.
- We plan to serve at least 100 families in the first year of the program.

## Early Intervention Support Group

To better connect with our Early Intervention families we started a support group. This support group will...

- Connect families with similar needs.
- Meet bi-monthly.
- Include things like a presentation from a local expert, allow for informal discussions, and unstructured play for children.
- Publish schedules and presenters in advance so families know what the main meeting topic will be.
- Allow families to attend meetings important to them and will build relationships within EI. The first set of support groups were held in Waverly.





# The Opioid Epidemic

Last year we were extremely fortunate to have an AmeriCorps member focus on the opioid epidemic. Elizana Joseph spent her one year term training Tioga County community members on how to identify opioid overdoses and how to administer Narcan.



Elizana helped make improvements to the Tioga County ASAP Coalition, including a monthly newsletter, planning community events and bringing new ideas to Tioga County.

## Tioga County ASAP

Tioga County Public Health continues to have an active role in the Tioga County Allies in Substance Abuse Prevention Coalition.

Multiple events took place in 2018 including:

- Black Balloon Day
- Overdose Awareness Day
- Family Fun Day
- Drug Take Back Events

Over the summer we also hosted local high school student and summer intern, Dominick Dryer who assisted the coalition with a film project focusing on Tioga County families affected by the opioid epidemic. Keep an eye out in 2019 for the first film screening!

In 2018 the Tioga County ASAP Coalition was also awarded the Drug Free Communities (DFC) Grant!

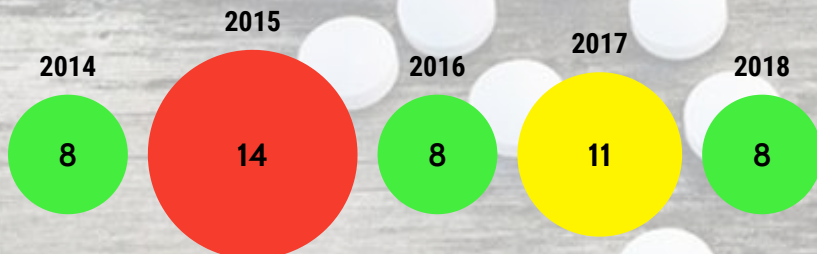

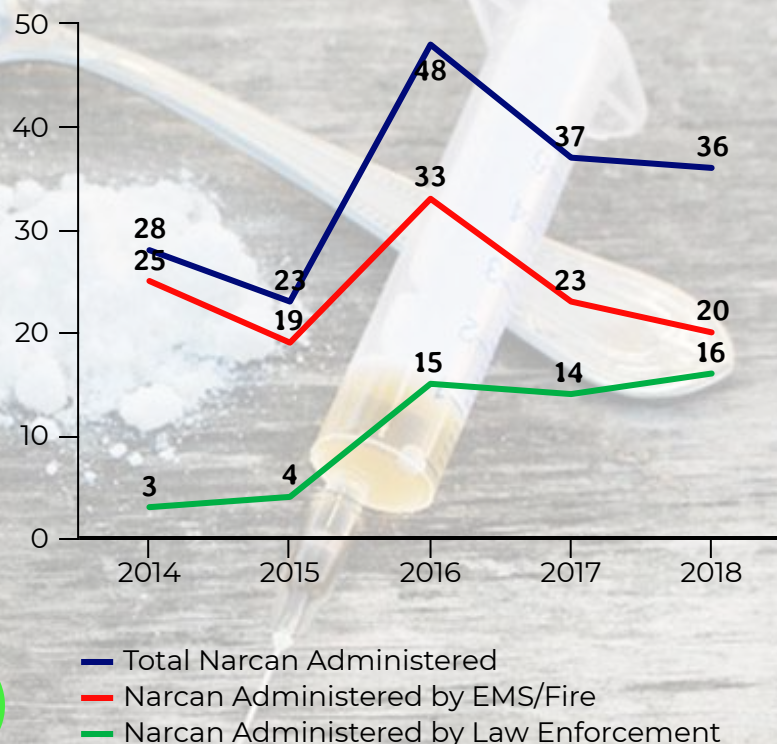

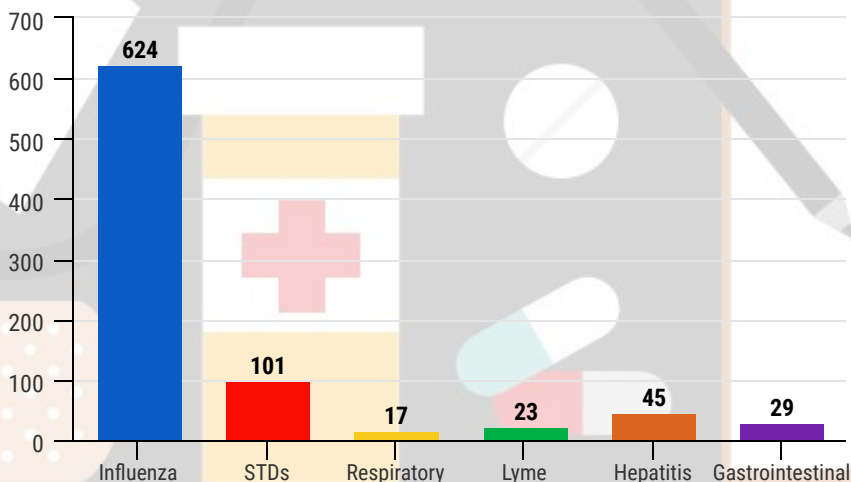

# Healthy Neighborhoods Program

The Healthy Neighborhoods Program is wrapping up its 5th year of our grant. This past year was a memorable one.

Some of our highlights include:

- Working with a local subdivision on a rat problem.
- Providing childproofing supplies for one family to prevent a child from turning on the stove, and another family for a child who had climbed out of an open window.
- Providing clean-up kits for those affected from summer flooding.
- We also found that 67% of the homes visited this year did not have functioning smoke detectors.

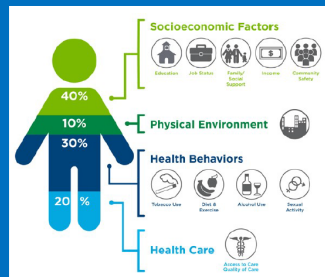

# "What the Health!?"

This year we decided to try something different to get people thinking about their health and the health of the environment around them. Every month we create a "What the Health!?" publication which includes information about topics such as the HPV vaccine, urine barometer to gauge if you're drinking enough water, and how to test for radon in your home.



Our Public Health Liaisons distribute these flyers and post them in their restroom stalls. It is hard not to read it when it's right in front of your face! Currently we have 21 sites in Tioga County sharing "What the Health!?" with the community.

## WHAT THE HEALTH!?

**Stroke Awareness Month**  
Stroke is a leading cause of serious long-term disability and the fifth leading cause of death in the United States. It kills over 150,000 people nationwide and more than 80 citizens of Tioga County each year.

**NATIONAL MENTAL HEALTH MONTH**  
Only 1 in 5 adults in the U.S. report mental health issues in a given year. Over 40% of adults who have a substance use disorder also have a co-occurring mental illness.

**PROTECT YOUR EYES**  
Wear eye protection when working with power tools, machinery, or equipment. Eye protection should be worn at all times when working with power tools, machinery, or equipment.

**STAY HYDRATED**  
Drink plenty of water throughout the day. Staying hydrated helps you stay alert and focused. It also helps you maintain a healthy weight and reduces your risk of chronic conditions.

**ALZHEIMER'S BRAIN AWARENESS MONTH**  
Alzheimer's disease is a progressive brain disorder that causes memory loss and other cognitive impairments. It is the leading cause of dementia in the United States.

**Use a Layered Approach for Sun Protection.**  
Wear a broad-spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher. Reapply every 2 hours, or more often if you are sweating or swimming. Wear sunglasses and a hat. Seek shade, especially during midday hours.

**KNOW MORE HEPATITIS**  
May is Hepatitis Awareness Month. Hepatitis is a group of liver diseases. It can be caused by viruses, alcohol, and certain medications. It can lead to liver damage and even liver failure.

**Rabies Vaccination Clinic**  
May 24<sup>th</sup> from 6-8pm at Newark Valley Fire Station

Not only do we want people thinking about their health but we also build communication with partners in the community. Our Public Health Liaisons will be instrumental in helping us get information out to the county in an emergency and, thanks to "What the Health!?" we have already developed those relationships.

## WHAT THE HEALTH!?

**Prescription Drug Safety**  
Is your medicine cabinet full of expired drugs or medications you no longer use? Your medicines for you, what if you give them to someone else? You can dispose of your expired, unwanted, or unused medicines by using one of the medication drop boxes in Tioga County.

**Winter & Holiday Fire Safety**  
Home fires occur more in the winter than any other season. Only plug in one heat-producing appliance into an electrical outlet at a time. Insulate and carbon monoxide alarms every month. Don't forget to test your smoke alarm!

**Holiday Fire Safety**  
Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant. Keep decorations away from windows and doors. Make sure your Christmas tree is at least 3 feet away from any heat source like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents, or lights. Never use lit candles to decorate your tree. Turn off all lights and decorations before leaving the home or going to bed.

**Candle Safety**  
Keep children and pets away from lit candles. Place lit candles away from decorations and other flammable items. Trim wicks and light up high and in locked cabinets. Blow out lit candles when you leave the room or go to bed.
